My Dad was a doctor and they had just named a ward after him at his old hospital (that night!) and I still remember ringing Mum at about 10pm to tell her to come up to the hospital as the twins were going to be born.

She had been very sad, thinking about Dad, so it was a brilliant night for all of us!

Who are the women (or people) who have made your life better and why?

My girlfriends have to be at the top of the list! I couldn't have lived my life without them. I am still really close to a lot of my school friends (we still meet up 2-3 times a year, and we met in 1978 when we moved to Australia). We have survived relationships, marriages, travelling and heartbreak together. She is godmother to my boys too. Just a rock-solid friendship that has stood the test of time. I would do anything for her, and vice versa.
